### MESSAGE FROM THE COMMANDER



For those that may not know the history of the game....

The Army-Navy Game is an annual college football game played between the United States Military Academy (Army) and the United States Naval Academy (Navy, including the Marines). The game is one of the oldest and most storied rivalries in college football and holds a special place in American sports culture. Here is a brief history of the Army-Navy Game:

- **First Game (1890):** The first Army-Navy football game took place on November 29, 1890, at West Point, New York. The Navy won the game, which marked the beginning of a tradition that would continue for over a century.
- Tradition and Pageantry: The Army-Navy Game is known for its rich tradition and pageantry. The

game is usually held in a neutral site, with locations such as Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New York City hosting the event. The pre-game activities include the famous "March On" by the Corps of Cadets and the Brigade of Midshipmen, as well as the ceremonial exchange of prisoners.

- Notable Moments: The Army-Navy Game has seen many memorable moments and upsets over the years. One of the most famous games occurred in 1963 when Navy quarterback Roger Staubach led the Midshipmen to a 21-15 victory.



Staubach went on to win the Heisman Trophy that year.

• Service Academy Dominance:
The Army-Navy Game often carries extra significance beyond the football field. It reflects the intense but friendly rivalry between the two service academies, both of which produce future leaders of the United States military.

The Army-Navy Game has become much more than a football game; it is a celebration of the dedication and commitment of the cadets and midshipmen who will go on to serve their country in the U.S. Army and U.S. Navy. The game is a unique tradition that resonates with fans and participants alike, making it a special event on the college football calendar.



It's the US Space Force Birthday. Afterall, SPACE FORCE is coming up on the BIG 5 in no time. Are you ready?? Here are the ABC's of the SPACE FORCE.

What's its original name - AIR FORCE SPACE COMMAND was renamed UNITED STATES SPACE FORCE.

I'm guessing by now, you know what date it become official – The US Space Force was established December 20, 2019, when the National Defense Authorization Act was signed into law, creating the first new branch of the armed services since 1947.

What is its MOTTO – "SEMPER SUPRA" is Latin for "Always Above" and is also the title of its branch anthem.

What is a Space Force member called – the Army has soldiers, but all Space Force personnel, whether civilian or military, are called "GUARDIANS". As of FY23, the Space Force has more than 14,000 military and civilian Guardians.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY

#### Kicking Off the New Year

As we kick off 2024, I want to reflect on both your record-breaking work in 2023 and the opportunity this new year presents to build on those positive outcomes for Veterans, their families, caregivers, and survivors.

This year, we're going to continue delivering more care and more benefits to even more Veterans. Most notably, beginning in March, all toxic-exposed Veterans will be eligible to enroll directly in VA health care under the PACT Act—including any Veteran who served in Iraq, Afghanistan, the Gulf War, or any other combat zone after 9/11. This will mean that millions of additional Veterans will have access to VA health care.

So, we must continue providing timely, excellent, world-class care. We must continue processing Veterans' claims and appeals faster than ever before, delivering the benefits they've earned and deserve. We must provide dignified resting places for millions of Vets and continue expanding the Veterans Legacy Memorial. We must continue transforming the way a record number of Veterans access VA care and benefits through state-of-the-art technology. And we must continue hiring and retaining our great staff and ensuring that each of you has the resources and support that you need.

As with every year, 2024 will certainly bring its own unique challenges, some we can anticipate, but others we cannot. In recent years Congress has significantly expanded VA's authority to serve Veterans—including with passage of the PACT Act—and provided us with the funding to carry out those new authorities. As a result, we can expect increased oversight from our congressional partners. We welcome it. Oversight is not only Congress's constitutional obligation; it makes us better, keeping us accountable to the Veterans we serve and to each other. Our Oversight Team—which includes members from OGC, OCLA, and OPIA—is working hard to ensure that we respond completely and promptly to Congress's questions.

Now, we should always be our own toughest critics. That means if you ever see something or hear about something that isn't right—if we aren't doing the very best we can for the Vets we serve or our teammates—you have to let us know. There are a number of ways you can raise the red flag. And if you're not being heard or if the seriousness of the situation dictates, you can reach out to the VA Office of Resolution Management, Diversity & Inclusion (ORMDI), the VA Office of Inspector General (OIG), the Office of Accountability and Whistleblower Protection (OAWP), or any other of a number of avenues of redress that you can find here.

There will likely be controversies and challenges this year, and they will get accentuated during this presidential election year. Please, remember that our noble mission, our singular purpose, and our critical responsibility is to always keep Veterans at the heart of everything we do. That requires each of us to stay out of politics. As Federal employees, political activities are limited under the Hatch Act. If you have any questions about what's doable and what's not, contact the VA Ethics Specialty Team or visit the OSC Website.

Each new year brings hope for success and joy. I also know that for any number of understandable reasons, each of us will face personal struggles. I know I will. And as I do, it is reassuring to know that I am a part of the best team in the Federal Government. So, if you find yourself struggling, you need not struggle alone. And if you know of fellow employees who are struggling, they need not struggle alone. Let's work together to ensure we get the right support that we need, and that we deserve. Help each other, and don't hesitate to reach out to the Employee Assistance Program, the great chaplains in the VA National Chaplain Service, and the National Suicide & Crisis Lifeline (call 988 or chat online).

This will be a year of challenges and, as you've proven time and again, great successes and victories for Veterans, their families, caregivers, and survivors. It's critical that we always remember them and stay squarely focused on our mission, serving Vets every bit as well as they have served—and continue serving—all of us.

Let me tell you about one of those Vets. One of my last trips of 2023 was to the Oscar G. Johnson VA Medical Center in Iron Mountain, Michigan, to celebrate that VAMC delivering consistent and enterprise-leading Veteran experience scores. While I was there, I had the honor of meeting a 98-year-old Army Vet named John Moddie. John's a resident at the local Community Living Center (CLC), and his story is incredible.

John fought in the Battle of the Bulge, one of the most deadly and vicious American battles of WWII, where he was captured by Nazi forces. John spent four long months as a POW, suffering grievous physical and emotional injuries in captivity before Allied forces liberated him from the German prison camp. After regaining his health, John settled down on Michigan's Upper Peninsula with his family.

I asked John about the care he was receiving from our VA teammates at Iron Mountain. He told me, "I've never seen better people than the people who work here. That's the honest to God truth. They're great ... If you have a problem, they'll get you the help you need. You can't ask for more than that."

John's right. I can't ask for more than that, and it's just one example of the many ways you are the very best workforce in the federal government. As I wrote in last week's End of Year All Employee Message, we can never put a figure to those countless miracles that are a product of your superb work, that improve and make Veterans lives better.

As we kick off this new year, I couldn't be prouder to be a member of your team, and I couldn't be more certain of the many positive outcomes that will come for Veterans in the year ahead.

### **Monthly Spiritual Reflection**

January is a month that provides us with a wealth of religious traditions that reflect the rich faith expressions and philosophies of our diverse workforce.

These traditions remind us of the sacred mission of VA to care for those who have borne the battle, as reflected in our I CARE Values: Integrity, Commitment, Advocacy, Respect, and Excellence.

New Year's Day (Christian) – January 1: The Gregorian calendar was introduced by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582. Many churches hold watchnight services on New Year's Eve, and Christians and non-Christians make New Year's resolutions.

Solemnity of Mary (Christian-Roman Catholic) – January 1: The solemnity of Mary, the mother of the eternal Son of God made man, who is God himself, is a holy day of obligation.

Shogatsu (Shinto) – January 1–3: Homes are purified to welcome the Shinto deity of the New Year, Toshigami, who bestows health and good luck for the year ahead.

Janus (Pagan) – January 1: Janus is a god of beginnings and endings, representing the year's transitions from one season to another. In modern times, we recognize him as the god of doors and gates.

Epiphany (Christian) – January 6: God reveals his salvation to the world when He revealed Himself through the manifestation of Jesus.

Armenian Orthodox Christmas Day (Christian-Armenian) – January 6: Celebration in concurrence with Epiphany and the baptism of Jesus.

Christmas (Christian-Orthodox) – January 7: Orthodox Christmas, marking the birth of Jesus.

Baptism of Jesus (Christian) – January 7: Feast honoring the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River by John the Baptist.

Rosh Chodesh Sh'vat (Jewish) – January 10: Celebration marking the start of a new lunar month. Throughout history, our light has waxed and waned. But even in utter darkness, it has never been extinguished.

Lohri - Maghi (Sikh) - January 13: Also known as Makara. Bonfires are lit in Hindu homes to greet the birth of sons in the families and

alms are distributed.

Orthodox New Year (Christian-Orthodox) – January 14: Celebration of the Christian Orthodox New Year.

Makar Sankranti (Hindu) – January 15: Dedicated to the sun god, Surya; the celebration of the sun entering the zodiac sign of Capricorn or Makar, which marks the end of the winter and the start of longer days.

Guru Gobind Singh Birthday (Sikh) – January 17: Celebration of Guru Gobind Singh, the son of Guru Tegh Bahadur, the tenth and last human Guru of the Sikh religion.

World Religion Day (Bahai) – January 21: A celebration of the teachings of unity found in all religious traditions. The observance begins at sundown.

Sadeh (Zoroastrianism) – January 24: Also known as Adur-Jashan (feast of fire). The bonfire drives back the winter in defiance of Ahriman (Satan).

Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul (Christian-Roman Catholic) – January 25: Celebrates St. Paul turning away from the persecution of Christians to promoting Christianity.

Tu Bishvat (Jewish) – January 25: Marks the season in which the earliest blooming trees in the Land of Israel emerge from their winter sleep and begin a new fruit-bearing cycle.

Thaipusam (Hindu) – January 25: A celebration of the victory of good over evil.

Mahayana New Year (Buddhist) – January 25: A time for self-reflection. Lessons from past mistakes are learned, and the goal is to become a better version of yourself.

Shabbat Shirah (Jewish): – January 26: The Sabbath of Singing and celebrating Moses and Miriam leading the Israelites across the Sea of Reeds (the Red Sea) and out of Egypt.

Holocaust Memorial Day (Jewish) – January 27: The day commemorating the millions of Jews and minority groups who were murdered by the Nazis during the Holocaust.

May this New Year find you joy-filled, peace adorned, and love abounding.

### Happy Birthday, David!

Michelangelo's David turns 520 years old on January 15, 2024. Created from a 13-foot block of marble sitting in the studio for nearly 30 years, Michelangelo set out to sculpt a statue of King David to be placed atop of the Florence cathedral. Instead, he decided to revolt against his patron Alessandro de Medici AND David, who fought against the tyranny of Goliath, became incarnate with the city representing Florence's defeat over an over-bearing giant - his patron Alessandro de Medici. The Statue of David is located in the Tribune, a special room inside the Galleria dell'Accademia in Florence, Italy. The Tribune is a round room, located in the heart of the museum, on the first floor, specifically designed to display the statue. It was created in the 19th century by the architect Emilio De Fabris.. It is said that Michelangelo's last words at the age of 87 were, "Ancora imparo," a Latin phrase which translates to "I am still learning." If you get the chance, go to Florence to see this magnificent statue, which truly represents the longevity and survival of this brilliant city, which gave birth to the Renaissance.

# CHINA'S CYBER ARMY HAS BEEN PROBING OUR CRITICAL POWER INFRASTRUCTURE, IN ORDER TO DISRUPT LIFE AND CREATE CHAOS IN THE U.S., WHEN A CONFLICT ERUPTS.



No one should be surprised that our potential enemies intend to cause real hardships in our nation by attacking the computers that manage our power infrastructure - if war breaks out.

The United States and China are vigorously competing to the superman of the skies. China logically a lead in weapons that are managed with Artificial Intelligence (AI) technology as they have been focusing and funding AI and many advanced technologies since they had their Sputnik moment in 2016 when they saw that an AI managed a computer software defeat China's best GO chess player. Appreciating how difficult it is to master the game of Go, when the best human player in China was soundly beaten by AI software, that was their Sputnik moment

They realized that AI software was smarter than humans. Most Americans are just beginning to realize that we must learn how to use AI, or we will lose to AI.

We are realizing that AI in our military is still hindered by many senior military officers who are still planning for future combat as if we were still in the 20th Century. We have four hundred (400) of our 4- star generals who grew up in the 20th Century and fought in that Century, but today, all those military tactics are irrelevant. Actually, it is highly likely that most of our senior officers with lengthy careers, are still not capable of effective war fighting technology to fight the next war.

We are told by many AI specialists that China's earlier focus on AI likely gives them a significant lead in several AI technologies. We are told that America holds the lead in .... but, I would not make that assumption.

Experts like Eric Schmidt and Sundar Pecar Henry Kissinger advised that America's ability to remain the world's most lethal military hinges on two interrelated — and vexing — mysteries.

Can soon-to-retire four-star generals truly foresee the awesome power of artificial intelligence in time to break generation-old habits and shift warfare theories?

If they do, can they convince the brightest coding minds to chuck lucrative gigs at Google to build AI-powered systems for America faster or better than their rivals in China?

Why it matters: Future wars will be won with Stanford nerds, faster chips, superior computing power and precision robotics on land, sea and air. Experts tell us that because of a lethal combination of congressional myopia and constipated Pentagon buying rules, America isn't mobilizing fast enough to prevail on future battlefields.

"We are witnessing an unprecedented fundamental change in the character of war, and our window of opportunity to ensure that we maintain an enduring competitive advantage is closing," retired Army Gen. Mark Milley, who then was chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, warned in a report he wrote shortly before retiring this fall.

What's happening: Eric Schmidt, the former Google CEO, said at last week's Axios AI+Summit in Washington that with cuttingedge tech being deployed in Ukraine, a drone is no longer just an uncrewed flying object. It's a "potent software platform" that's a big step toward more automated war.

- "It's clear that drones and other weapons based on autonomy can replace tanks, artillery and mortars," Schmidt told us in a later interview. "The success of Ukraine and also Russia on the battlefield proves this point."
- But experts warn the U.S. is still spending too much time and money building aircraft carriers and other outmoded artifacts of analog war, because of the archaic restraints of what the late Senate Armed Services Chair John McCain called the "military-industrial-congressional complex."

What they're saying: Retired Army Gen. David Petraeus — former top commander in Iraq and Afghanistan, and former CIA director, who's author of the new best-seller "Conflict" — told us that tanks, ships and planes must be largely supplanted over time by a massive armada of much cheaper, smaller, uncrewed, algorithmically piloted systems.

 "Aircraft carriers are still vital, as we see in the Middle East right now, but we will have to make choices for the future," Petraeus said.

Future models will increasingly separate the service member from the weapon, letting uncrewed systems do the most dangerous work.

 "Humans will be on the loop rather than in the loop," Petraeus said. "You will have a human at some point say: 'OK, machine. You're free to take action according to the computer program we established for you' — rather than re-





motely piloting it."

The big picture: The answers to those two big questions are being determined now, as military experts sound the alarm about ways the tectonic shift in military power is threatening America in real time. Milley's report, "Strategic Inflection Point," is a 10-page wake-up call.

- "The American homeland has almost always been a sanctuary during conflict, but this will not be the case in a future war," Milley wrote. "Robust space and cyber capabilities allow adversaries to target critical national infrastructure."
- Milley is among those warning privately that too many four-star generals — typically in their mid-50s to early 60s — are too old and too connected to conventional warfare to shift fast enough, sources tell us.
- Army Gen. Erik Kurilla commander of U.S. Central Command, which includes the Middle East — is seen as the most technologically innovative of the roughly 40 four-stars in the military today.

Zoom in: China — and AI — are the central focus of every future-of-defense conversation. Beijing knows technology alone can help leapfrog America, despite long being outspent by us (though the gap has mostly closed).

 Chinahas both a 2025 and 2050 plan to displace America as the world's most fearsome nation. And it has 4x as many people to draw from in the hunt for coders, scientists, quantum computing ex-



### WHAT'S THE NAME OF THE AIR FORCE'S REPLACEMENT FOR THE F-35?

That name is the "Next Generation Air Dominance (NGAD)" jet fighter.

There might be a pilot driven version, but most will be pilotless. Without a pilot, the NGAD will be smaller and extremely maneuverable.

One potential schema is to have one manned NGAD accompanied by many more unmanned NGAD.

Will NGAD Be Worth It? While few nations even can develop and field a fifthgeneration fighter, the United States is already working on a sixth-generation fighter. Known as the Next Generation Air Dominance (NGAD) program, the sixth-generation fighter is expected to be technologically advanced — and fiscally prohibitive, leading some to question whether the advanced airframe is worth the sticker price.

Only the US, Russia, and China have successfully fielded a fifth-generation fighter. Only the US and China have fielded a fifth-generation fighter (the US's F-22 Raptor and F-35 Lightning II; China's J-20 Mighty Dragon) in meaningful quantity. Fifth-generation technology is still cutting-edge beyond what most nations can develop.

Fifth-generation technology includes stealth, internal weapons bays, advanced avionics, super-cruise, thrust vectoring, data fusion, interconnectivity, and, in the case of the F-35, a situational -awareness-boosting pilot helmet costing \$400,000 per unit.

The US was ahead of the curve in developing fifth-generation technology. Feeling the pressure of Soviet aerospace

development, the US began working towards the F-22 Raptor in the mid-1980s. By the end of the 1990s, the F-22 was flying, demonstrating clearly that a new era in aviation had arrived.

Now, however, with China and Russia catching up, the US is taking the initiative to again set the curve with fighter tech advancement. The NGAD program commenced in 2014 and is expected to one day replace the F-22 Raptor, despite the fact that the F-22 is still, in many respects, the envy of the aviation world.

What is a sixth-generation aircraft? The exact technology in a sixth-generation fighter has not yet been defined. The class exists only in concept. And in concept, the only defined feature of the sixth-generation fighter is that it will be more advanced than the fifth-generation fighter. That's vague, but what it probably means is that the jet will have advanced digital capabilities, human-systems integration, variable cycle engines, increased range stand-off and BVR weapons. Perhaps even laser weapons.

The NGAD specifically is expected to revolve around four technological advancements: propulsion; uncrewed systems; materials; and sensors.

With respect to propulsion, "the Air Force intends to field these new fighters with advanced adaptive cycle engines that will offer more power, more fuel economy, better heat regulation and power production, and greater loiter times than were possible with earlier engine designs," journalist Alex Hollings wrote.

With respect to materials, "advances in material science are often among the most secretive elements of stealth aircraft design, as today's Radar Absorbent materials are rated to absorb as much as 80% of inbound radar waves, but limit fighter performance due to their fragility. Improved RAM could reduce maintenance costs, improve stealth, and allow for greater performance," Hollings wrote.

And with respect to sensors, "the NGAD program leans further into the F-35's air combat methodology of detecting and targeting enemy aircraft from greater ranges than ever before, allowing the



fighter to engage and destroy enemy jets before they ever even know the fighter was there."

The NGAD will be built around a "family of systems." The families centerpiece system will be a manned aircraft — the successor of the F-22. NGAD's manned aircraft has been referred to as the Penetrating Counter-Air (PCA). In addition to the PCA, the NGAD program is expected to also feature an uncrewed element — the collaborate combat aircraft (CCA), also known as the loyal wingman platform.

NGAD stems from a 2014 Defense Advanced Research Project Agency (DARPA) study. The DARPA study was designed to explore new concepts in air superiority, which would be relevant in the 2030s. The study eventually evolved into the NGAD program, which aims to field a sixth-generation fighter.

### ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) AND FUTURE WARFARE AND HOW AI AND FUTURE WARFARE WILL AFFECT THE AMERICAN LEGION

If you have been following AI and wondering about how AI will affect future warfare, there is much to ponder.

We have seen how the Ukrainian military has used information from satellite intelligence to negate a destroy Russian armor, aircraft, missiles and drone attacks and thousands of Russian ground troops. The Russians have also used AI to harm the Ukrainians. Most of these AI efforts have not been long term, planned actions, but were quickly adapted and employed. It certainly appears that AI has prevented a much larger Russian military to overwhelm the smaller Ukrainian forces. But with help from America and AI technology, the Ukrainians have held off the Russians quite well and prevented the expected quick Russian victory.

Let's now discuss how AI will likely impact future warfare, especially involving the U.S., China, and Russia.

AI technology has developed to the point that soldiers, including all the services, are no longer relevant. Opponent combat troops will overwhelmed with powerful robots in many variations who are armed and don't miss. Check out these videos:

In our Navy, there has been one major Navy system that is public. That is the "Orca" crewless submarine. We reported on the Orca in a recent Cathay Post Digest, so won't do into detail here. It is run by battery power with a maximum range of 6,500 miles capable of most submarine missions. It potentially will operate with a fleet of other Navy vessels including undersea drones.

In our Air Force, we have the Next Generation Air Dominance jet fighter which is also crewless and will also be used in conjunction with multiple pilotless jet fighters (and other AF jets with pilots) to be a very powerful offensive tactic.

In our Air Force, our Space Command will



have a really vital mission as a future war is likely to be in space, and success in space can render ground forces, navy forces and air forces ineffective if communications can be disrupted or destroyed.

Manpower requirements will be reduced dramatically meaning that in a decade or two, the number of veterans will be much smaller and that will mean that manpower for veterans groups, including our American Legion will be much smaller.

perts and advanced weapon systems architects.

- Take hypersonic missiles. They move so fast that no modern defense system can come close to shooting them down until moments before they hit. China is far ahead of the U.S. in the hypersonic arms race — a potential scary edge in a conflict over Taiwan or beyond.
- China has successfully tested a hypersonic missile with a range of at least 1,000 miles, allowing it to reach U.S. forces in the western Pacific, a U.S. Defense Intelligence Agency scientist told Congress.

Details: Quantum technologies — which include ultra-precise sensors and more secure communications — promise to vastly improve military targeting and encryption.

 Nimble next-gen defense startups are already vying with legacy giants. Anduril Industries — founded by Palmer Luckey, who designed the headmounted Oculus Rift and sold the technology to Facebook — on Friday unveiled an autonomous weapons platform, Roadrunner, with a portable hangar so compact it looks like an outhouse. (YouTube)

Reality check: America is crushing China so far in the machine-learning race, with the leading generative AI models designed and housed here.

• This is a big, if unspoken, reason President Biden is reluctant to regulate AI in meaningful ways. And Silicon Valley is quick to hit this fear hard when lobbying Congress to stay hands-off.

State of play: Michèle Flournoy — former undersecretary of defense for policy, and now co-founder of WestExec Advisors — told us that while every branch of the military has an innovation hub, the risk-averse culture means these efforts "are still on the margins of the main acquisition and budget processes."

 "The Pentagon has gotten very good at tech-scouting and demonstrating and experimenting and prototyping," Flournoy said. "But actually moving things into production at scale has been a challenge."

What to watch: Experts tell us they expect Washington to pour gobs of new spending into next-gen warfighting as fears rise of China invading Taiwan — a once-distant threat that now could happen in the next presidential term.

"The United States is a heartbeat away from a world war that it could lose," Wess Mitchell, an assistant secretary of state for Europe in the last administration, wrote last month in a Foreign Policy article that got a ton of attention in national security circles.

The bottom line: Washington is buying hardware for the last war when it should be buying more software for the next one.

Remember to avoid flushing any of these items, which have been fished out from under our streets:

### 1. Food fat

A serious problem, as it tends to bind around wet wipes and other detritus like clay around straw. "It slips down sinks very easily when it's warm," says Simon Evans of Thames Water, "but once it hits our sewers it cools down and congeals into what we call fatbergs."

#### 2. Condoms

Difficult to flush, but clearly many people manage it. Evans: "I've been down the sewers in central London and seen what appear to be fish on the surface. They're actually condoms filled with air, bobbing around. It is pretty grim."

#### Pets

Goldfish are most common, of course, but

hamsters and gerbils are also seen. "They don't help, because they're quite sturdy little things."

### 4. Nappies

These are a rarity, because of the sheer difficulty of getting one round the U-bend to begin with, but the blockages they cause can be terrible.

### 5. Human body parts

These have been found by Thames Water "flushers", as sewer operatives are known – most often fingers or even hands. In truth, the people sending them down toilets probably have bigger things than sewer abuse to worry about.

#### 6. Cotton buds and tampons

They just won't break down. It may take months or years for a fatty ball of them to accumulate, but in the end they do block drains, which then have to be unblocked by hand. Also, diapers (baby and Senior), bladder leak pads, and paper towels will clog your toilet.

### 7. Half a Mini

Since 2018 more than 2000 seniors have wandered away at all times of the day, and more than 100 have perished. Data on these deaths are not collected by anyone, so we can assume that there are a few more than were noted in this Post investigation.

Including victims of Alzheimer's disease, dementia is a threat to almost all seniors. Most people assume that once they place their elders in a senior home, that they would be safe and there would be precautions to protect their elders from danger.

Unfortunately, when seniors are mobile, it isn't easy to track everyone 24 hours a day.

Placing a senior in an assisted living facility is only possible for families who are wealthy, or have saved for years, and can cover the cost of moving in which can be more than \$50,000 and cost \$5,000 – 10,000 a month. If the senior owns a home, the sale of the



home is often necessary to cover the cost of moving into an assisted living facility.

And after all that gruesome reality, these facilities do not have an adequate security staff and procedures to protect ambulatory seniors from wandering away from their residence.

Public laws must be written to provide standards and guidance for the management of all facilities that care for seniors.

If not done, who wants to move into an assisted living facility, or any other senior home?

### Tax Deductions That Seniors Often Overlook

**MANY OLDER** Americans are missing out on valuable tax breaks offered by the IRS, leaving behind savings that could make a difference for their financial well-being.

"The reason this is happening is because the tax code is complicated, and rules on tax exemptions are constantly changing," says Tom O'Saben, director of tax content and government relations at the National Association of Tax Professionals in Washington, D.C. "This makes it hard for the average taxpayer to know about the array of tax breaks available to them."

Since 2017, O'Saben says, there have been five big tax-law changes, including the Trump-era Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, the pandemic-era Cares Act, and President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act. These changes have brought new tax breaks, diminished the use of others, and otherwise muddled the tax-filing process.

The Internal Revenue Service offers Tax Counseling for the Elderly, a community-based program that includes free tax-return preparation for seniors who are age 60 and over who are usually in low-to-moderate income brackets.

Here's a look at four often-overlooked tax deductions for seniors that can offer potentially lucrative savings.

### **Extra standard deduction**

Each filing season millions of Americans take the standard deduction—a flat dollar amount determined by the IRS that reduces taxable income—instead of itemizing deductions such as mortgage interest and charitable donations on their 1040 tax form. According to the IRS, 87.3% of tax filers claimed the standard deduction during fiscal year 2020.

"Taking a standard deduction makes sense if the amount is higher than the total itemized deductions that can lower your tax bill," says Lisa Greene-Lewis, a certified public accountant and tax expert at TurboTax who says the IRS has increased this tax break by 7% for the 2023 tax year.

This tax year the total standard deduction is

\$13,850 for single filers, and \$27,700 for married couples filing jointly.

In the 2023 tax year, seniors who are age 65 or over or blind and meet certain qualifications are now eligible for an extra standard deduction on top of the regular deduction. This is one of the annual inflation adjustments under tax law that can help older Americans with low annual gross income.

The extra standard deduction for seniors for 2023 is \$1,850 for single filers or who file as head of household, and \$3,000 for married couples—if each spouse is 65 or over—filing jointly. Those increases boost the total standard deduction for single filers and married couples filing jointly—to \$15,700 and \$30,700, respectively.

To qualify, a senior can't be claimed as a dependent by another taxpayer. There are also other IRS rules for eligibility. Among them: A married individual filing separately can't take the extra standard deduction if his or her spouse itemizes deductions, and an estate or trust, common trust fund or partnership can't claim it.

If you are 65 and older and blind, the extra standard deduction is \$3,700 if you are single or filing as head of household, and if married \$3,000 for each spouse, filing jointly or separately. This deduction is available to those who are legally blind and it requires a doctor's confirmation in cases where the taxpayer has less than total blindness.

According to IRS spokesman Eric Smith, "about 25.3 million seniors and blind tax filers claimed the additional tax deduction in tax year 2020."

### IRA contributions by a spouse

Many people don't know they can contribute earned income to a nonworking, or low-earning, spouse's individual retirement account if they file a joint tax return as a married couple. These so-called spousal IRAs are just like traditional IRAs, reducing pretax income. They aren't joint accounts; each IRA is set up in the name of the individual spouse. And Roth IRAs aren't eligible for this strategy.

"This spousal IRA strategy can double retirement savings for the year while reducing a couple's tax bite," says Nathan Anderson, a certified public accountant and certified financial planner at Prairiewood Wealth Management in West Fargo, N.D.

For the 2023 tax year, married couples who file jointly can contribute \$6,500 to a spousal IRA per individual for a total of \$13,000. If they are both 50 and older, each individual is allowed an extra \$1,000 catch-up contribution for a total of \$15,000. Keep in mind the IRS has specific guidelines on spousal IRAs. A working spouse must earn at least as much money as he or she contributed to both of the couple's IRAs. Married couples must file a joint tax return to be eligible, and there is no age limit as long as at least one person has earned income.

"Remember this is not for every retiree," says Sean Mullaney, president of Mullaney Financial & Tax in Los Angeles. "If you have no earned income and you just have Social Security, you cannot do this."

### Qualified charitable distributions

Seniors who give money to charity to lower their taxable income often make a mistake. They withdraw a large sum from their bank account or a traditional IRA and then write a check to the nonprofit or organization of their choice. As a result, they are missing a valuable tax deduction.

Instead, tax pros say they should use a qualified charitable distribution, or QCD, which allows individuals over 70½ to transfer up to \$100,000 a year from their traditional IRA directly to a charity tax-free, even if they aren't itemizing deductions. Married couples filing jointly can donate \$200,000 annually and neither can contribute more than \$100,000.

These contributions must be made to a qualified 501 (c)(3) charity defined by the IRS such as private foundations and religious organizations and schools. They can't be to donor-advised funds. You can check what types of institutions are qualified on IRS.gov.

"This is one of the biggest tax breaks for seniors and a great opportunity to lower taxable income," says Brett Koeppel, president of Eudaimonia Wealth, a financialplanning firm in Buffalo, N.Y.

In years when you need to take the annual withdrawal known as a required minimum distribution, or RMD—currently, this typically applies to people 73 or older—you can direct your administrator to direct your distribution as a QCD to an eligible charity. That would exclude the RMD from your taxable income, he notes. Keep in mind the IRS has specific age formulas on RMDs so

you'll need to check those rules.

The good news is that these payouts don't add to adjusted gross income, which is used by Medicare to determine the cost of your monthly premiums. (The higher your adjusted gross income, the higher your Income -Related Monthly Adjustment Amounts, or Irmaa, can be, although these amounts are usually based on a recipient's income from two years before, so 2023 premiums are based on an individual's 2021 income.)

But tax professionals caution that this QCD issue can be tricky. That is because custodians of qualified retirement accounts such as IRAs aren't required to break down what distributions from an account went to charity. They just provide the number of distribution transactions and the gross dollar amount withdrawn during the year on the

1099-R tax form.

"It's up to the taxpayer to sort this out and make sure it is reported correctly with his or her tax preparer," Koeppel says. You need to keep track of what charities are getting distributions and have documents that state they received your funds, he explains.

### **Medicare premium deduction**

"If you are a retiree who is self-employed, you can deduct your Medicare premiums even if you don't itemize," Koeppel says. This includes Medicare Part B and D, plus the cost of supplemental Medigap policies or the cost of a Medicare Advantage plan. The IRS considers you self-employed for this deduction if you own a business as either a sole proprietor (Schedule C), partner (Schedule E), limited liability company member, or S corporation shareholder with

at least 2% of the company stock. Other special rules apply. See the instructions on the 1040 form for details.

This tax benefit isn't subject to the 7.5% of adjusted gross income test that applies to itemized medical expenses. (Under that rule, you can claim medical deductions for amounts paid for everything from dental bills to nursing-home care that exceed 7.5% of gross income.)

There are caveats. You must have business income since you can deduct your premiums by only as much as you earn from your business, say tax experts. You also can't claim this deduction when your health insurance is covered by a retiree medical plan hosted by a former employer, or by your spouse's employer's medical plan.

### WHO WAS FU XIAOTIAN?

This is a story from CNN, published on September 27, 2023

Let's cut to the chase. Most Americans do not know who FU is. She was the mistress of former Chinese Foreign Minister Qin Gang who had a baby born in the U.S.. Qin disappeared from his post for more than a month before it was reported that he had been fired. The news was also surprising because Qin was known as close colleague of President Xi Jinping.

It certainly was possible that Qin's relationship with Fu was known to American intelligence. Not many foreign ministers have affairs and a baby in the foreign nation they are serving, especially in the United States which has a very competitive relationship with his country.

Had this occurred in China, the affair might not have cost Qin his job. No one in recent Chinese history has been fired for having an affair, but this involved one of the most senior officials in their government, so had to be treated differently. It was reported that an internal investigation was taken to determine if Qin might have been compromised. Wall Street Journal learned from Chinese officials that an internal Communist Party investigation found Qin to have been engaged in an extramarital affair that led to the birth of a child in the US while serving as China's Ambassador to the United States.

The two met in 2010 in London when Fu obtained her Master's degree at Cambridge University and had a long affair that ended when the relationship was exposed in America.

San Francisco fans wished we had landed him. But not at that price.




